Kyriacos C. Nicolaou, Ph.D.

Kyriacos C. Nicolaou was born in 1946 in the picturesque town of Karavas, on the northern coast of Cyprus. The ruins of the historic city of Lampousa are located within the limits of the Municipality of Karavas, which has been under occupation by the Turkish troops since the tragic invasion of Cyprus in 1974. In an

essay he published in 2003 in a scientific journal, Kyriacos writes: "Growing up in the panoramic village of Karavas on the northern coast of Cyprus was an incredibly enriching experience, despite the absence of material goods other than those provided bv With nature. the Mediterranean Sea defining the idyllic coast on one side, and the sharply ascending pine-covered mountains on the other, the vil-

lage was buried in lemon groves, thereby earning its epithet as the "Lemon Capital" of Cyprus, if not the whole Europe. Being the oldest of six children, Kyriacos began contributing to the family's income at the young age of seven, delivering milk from the family's single cow on a secondhand bicycle. He attended the elementary school in Karavas and the Pancyprian Gymnasium in Nicosia. His journey west began upon graduation from the Pancyprian Gymnasium at the age of 18, when he traveled to England to pursue studies in chemistry. While learning English, he worked in a rubber factory, a sausage establishment and, most frequently, in "fish and chip" shops. In 1966, he entered Bedford College, London, where he earned his Bachelor of Science degree (First Class Honors) in 1969. His advanced studies in chemistry were carried out at the University of London (Ph.D. 1972). In 1972, he crossed the Atlantic to the United States and completed postdoctoral appointments at Columbia

University (1972-1973) and Harvard University (1973-1976), after which he joined the faculty at the University of Pennsylvania, where he rose through the ranks to become the Rhodes-Thompson Professor of Chemistry. In 1989, he accepted joint appointments at the University of California, San Diego, where he is

Professor of Chemistry, and The Scripps Research Institute, where he is the Chairman of the Department

of Chemistry.

For his scientific work, Professor Nicolaou has received numerous awards and honors, including the Award for Creative Work in Synthetic Organic Chemistry, American Chemical Society; the Chemical Pioneer Award, American Institute of Chemists; the Decoration of the Order of the

Commander of Honor Medal (bestowed by the President of Greece); the ACS Nobel Laureate Signature Award for Graduate Education in Chemistry (2003); and the Aristeio Bodossaki Prize. Kyriacos is a member of numerous scientific institutions, including the National Academy of Sciences (USA) and the Academy of Athens, and holds 12 honorary degrees from universities around the world. He is the author or co-author of over 700 scientific articles, reviews, and book chapters, over 60 patents, and 4 books. His dedication to chemical education is evidenced by his training of more than 400 graduate students and postdoctoral fellows.

While traveling and lecturing throughout the world, Kyriacos takes time to inform his colleagues of the tragic invasion and occupation of Cyprus and his hometown Karavas, and the need to restore the human rights of the Cypriot people and the return of the refugees

to their homeland.



Lampousa Treasures

Lampousa is the name by which the city of Lapithos, one of the ancient kingdoms of Cyprus, was known during the early Christian period and Byzantine era. The city flourished, mainly because of its port and shipyard and, according to legend, it was given the name Lampousa, meaning the "gleaming" or "shining" one, because of its prosperity and wealth, or possibly because of its lighthouse, which shed a shining light to the surrounding region. Today, the ruins of Lampousa, or "Katalimata", as they were known to the locals, are located within the Municipality of Karavas, on the northern coast of Cyprus, which has been under Turkish occupation since the 1974 invasion of the island.

When the Arab raiders besieged Lampousa in 653-654 A.D., they allowed the inhabitants to leave, provided that they surrendered their gold, silver and other precious objects. Apparently, some wealthy inhabitants decided to bury some of their valuable belongings, hoping that one day they would return to their homes. Two groups of such magnificent objects, known as the First and Second Lampousa Treasures, were discovered hundreds of years later by local farmers and quarry workers.

The First Lampousa Treasure was discovered in the late 1800s, and included a silver incensory (censer), two sil-

ver dishes, and at least 24 silver spoons. Most of these objects are at the British Museum in London.

The Second (and more significant) Lampousa Treasure was discovered in 1902, reportedly by a Karavas local named Konstantis Kariolis, while he was cutting or collecting building stones at the local quarry, near the small chapel of Saint Evlalios, the first Bishop of Lampousa. The treasure, which is an outstanding example of exquisite 6th and 7th century Byzantine art, included 14 silver dishes, most of them depicting events in the life of King David, 16 gold medals with inscriptions and depictions of Byzantine emperors, gold necklaces, belts, crosses, bracelets, rings and earrings. According to legend, the treasure also included many "Constantinata", gold coins minted in Constantinople. Most of the treasure ended up in Paris, where, in 1906, was bought by John Pierpoint Morgan, an American financier, banker and art collector. In 1917, his son donated the treasure to the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City. Part of the treasure is currently exhibited in the museum's Byzantine wing. Other pieces of the treasure are in the collection of Dumbarton Oaks in Washington, D.C., and the Cyprus Museum in Nicosia.

Dr. Nicolaou, Congratulations! You more than deserve this award and make us all very proud.


